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New Library Hours

The Law Library will be open on Saturday for the last time on March 8th and then closed on weekends in the future. Legal research patterns have changed in the past 10 years and as a result use of the Seattle branch has dropped significantly on Saturdays. We believe it is now better to redirect these operation funds back into the collection and the services we provide during the regular week. You can:

Tech Tip: Keeping Your Browser Clean

Internet Explorer uses a variety of temporary files to make surfing the Internet easier and faster. It can store passwords so that you don't have to continually retype them; it can remember bits of data like your name and phone number so that you don't have to re-enter them on Web forms; it can store information about the web sites you visit and data sent back to your computer from

these sites so that the same content loads faster if you revisit the site. The downside is that eventually these files can clutter up your hard drive and actually impair the efficiency of your browser. Long-term retention of these files is also a potential security risk and can reveal to someone else your Internet browsing habits.

It's important to understand that Internet Explorer is maintaining these temporary files and to periodically clean them out. To manage these files, start Internet Explorer, open the Tools drop-down menu and then select the Delete Browsing History... option. The Delete Browsing History window will open and give you the chance to clean out a variety of different temporary files. The list includes Temporary Internet Files, Cookies, History, Form Data, and Passwords. Temporary Internet Files contains information from the web sites you've visited recently—including images, text and other browser display data—and is the option you'll want to clean out regularly to keep Internet Explorer running smoothly. Cookies are bits of data stored on your computer's hard drive by the web sites you visit that make using these site easier. However, they can also be used to track your browsing preferences and reveal some personal information so you will also want to clean them out periodically. If you are using a public or shared computer and want to make sure you've erased all of your browser activity, you will want to select the Delete All option before you close Internet Explorer.
